



 - Plagues




- 5 Generations ~ a century ...

 - Most people had no crops or livestock followed game & gathered plants





- 5 Generations ~ a century ...

 - sapiens, neanderthal, denisovan, luziensis, floriensis
 - Paleolithic tools
 - Language? Symbols?

 - Reliable hunting








Archuleta Brothers at Yeso Homestead

- Late 1800s, two
 Archuleta brothers set up a homestead at the Rito del Yeso as a base for cattle and horse rustling
- Area developed a reputation for people disappearing, never to be seen again!

- They cultivated the legend of giant 30-foot rattlesnake *Vivaron* to scare outsiders away
- One killed the other, then was hanged by locals on the ranch
- Homestead came to be known as Rancho de los Brujos

Dude Ranches & Rich Tourists

- Early 20th Century Americans wanted the West to be wild
- Expats from Boston, New York, Chicago came to reinvent themselves among unfamiliar landscapes & cultures
- Centuries of multicultural interaction & tolerance in the SW encouraged them to pursue their muse, explore partnerships in & out of marriage, broaden their sexual identities
- Rich owners with lots of wealthy buddies


Arthur N. Pack in front of his Fairchild airplane with a relocated baby antelope at Ghost Ranch in 1934.




The Ghost Ranch ox skull and sign marking road to the ranch. Photograph by Ansel Adams, 1937.




















From Pack to Presbyterians



Pack moved to **Tucson in 1946 &** founded the **Desert Museum**

Sold Ghost Ranch to the **Presbyterian** Church in 1955

Rev Hall & the Revolucion

- 1966: armed uprising to reclaim Spanish Land Grants threatened Ghost Ranch
- Arrested ranger & police at Echo Amphitheater!
- Tanks & machine guns put the rebellion down
- Rev Jim Hall opened the ranch to livestock, funded schools & health clinics, broadened programming



Great Land Trade
